Exchange of Notes constituting a Provisional Commercial Agreement regarding Trade between Cyprus and Egypt. Cairo, May 26th, 1941.

English official text communicated by the Under-Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs of the Kingdom of Egypt and by His Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs in Great Britain. The registration took place August 12th, 1941.

No. 4793. — EXCHANGE OF NOTES¹ BETWEEN HIS MAJESTY'S GOVERNMENT IN THE UNITED KINGDOM AND THE EGYPTIAN GOVERNMENT CONSTITUTING A PROVISIONAL COMMERCIAL AGREEMENT REGARDING TRADE BETWEEN CYPRUS AND EGYPT. CAIRO, MAY 26TH, 1941.

CAIRO, May 26th, 1941.

In accordance with instructions from His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, I have the honour to inform Your Excellency that, with a view to facilitating and increasing trade between Cyprus and Egypt, His Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland are prepared to conclude with the Egyptian Government an Agreement in the following terms:

- (1) The Egyptian Government undertake that pomegranates the produce of Cyprus shall not be subject on importation into Egypt to any import duty other or higher than 100 milliemes per 100 kilos gross.
- (2) His Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom undertake that the undermentioned commodities the produce of Egypt shall not be subject on importation into Cyprus to any import duties other or higher than those specified in the first column below and that the duties levied on the like produce of countries enjoying preferential rates in Cyprus will not fall below the duties levied on Egyptian produce by more than the percentage specified in the second column below:

(3) Where potatoes the produce of Cyprus are imported into Egypt and the consignment is accompanied by a certificate issued by the Department of Agriculture, Cyprus, to the effect stated below, the Egyptian Government agree not to prohibit the entry of the consignment on phytopathological grounds, unless it is found on inspection to be infected with wart disease (Synchytrium endobioticum) or unless the plant diseased of powdery scab or common scab exceed the ratio mentioned in the certificate, in which cases the consignment shall be re-exported or destroyed.

The certificate shall state that:

(a) The consignment concerned is not infected with powdery scab or common scab to the extent of more than 10 per cent of the total number of tubers with more than 10 per cent of the surface scabbed;

(b) Wart disease does not exist in Cyprus.

Nothing in this agreement shall exclude the right of the Egyptian Government to submit the entry of potatoes imported from Cyprus to the treatment, particularly treatment by fumigation, provided for in the laws and *arrêtés* issued or to be issued by the Egyptian authorities for the protection of potatoes produced in Egypt.

(4) Where fresh or semi-dried dates, mangoes, or bananas the produce of Egypt are imported into Cyprus, and the consignment is accompanied by a certificate from the Ministry of Agriculture, Egypt, in the form of Agr. 77 Pl. Quarantine Certificat Phytopathologique (which form is annexed to this note) His Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom agree, subject to paragraph (6) below, that the entry of the consignment shall not be prohibited on phytopathological grounds and that the consignment shall not be subjected to any phytopathological examination or treatment for the plant diseases mentioned in the certificate provided there is inserted thereon:

Chrysomphalus aonidum. C. personatus. Phenococcus hirsutus. P. mangiferae. Icerya spp.

- (5) Dried dates the produce of Egypt imported into Cyprus shall be admitted without any phytopathological examination and without any certificate.
- (6) Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraph 4 above, fresh or semi-dried dates, mangoes, or bananas the produce of Egypt imported into Cyprus may be examined for living insects and refused entry into the country if they are found to contain such insects. If fruit found to contain such insects is landed at Famagusta, fumigation of the consignment will be allowed there at the cost of the consignee and if on further inspection after fumigation the fruit is found to be free of living insects the consignment will be released. If the fruit is found to be still infected the consignment will be either destroyed or allowed to be re-exported. If fruit found to contain such insects is landed at any port other than Famagusta, the consignment will either be destroyed or allowed to be re-exported. The Cyprus Government will neither require a certificate that such fruit has been fumigated in Egypt before export nor will it accept a certificate to this effect as dispensing the consignment from the examination and procedure indicated above. Nevertheless, in order to minimise the cases in which such fruit the produce of Egypt is detained in Cyprus on account of infestation with living insects, the Egyptian Government will exercise the utmost supervision to ensure that the fruit is subjected to fumigation in Egypt in so far as facilities for fumigation exist before export.
- (7) If any agricultural product imported into Cyprus is refused entry or destroyed, the Department of Agriculture, Cyprus, will as a matter of routine notify the Ministry of Agriculture, Egypt, of this fact and the reasons therefor. Similarly if any agricultural product imported into Egypt is refused entry or destroyed, the Ministry of Agriculture, Egypt, will as a matter of routine notify the Department of Agriculture, Cyprus, of this fact and the reasons thereof.
- 2. If the foregoing proposals are acceptable to the Egyptian Government, I have the honour to suggest that the present note and Your Excellency's reply to that effect be regarded as constituting

an Agreement between the two Governments which shall take effect on the 1st July and shall continue in force until six months after the date on which either contracting Government shall have given notice of termination.

I avail myself of this opportunity to renew to Your Excellency the assurance of my very high consideration.

CAIRO, May 26th, 1941.

With reference to the notes exchanged this day regarding the conclusion of the provisional commercial agreement between Egypt and the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland in the name of the Government of the Island of Cyprus, I have the honour to inform your Excellency that the Egyptian Government will suspend for the duration of the war only the application of the provisions of paragraph (3) of the said agreement providing for the rejection of consignments of potatoes from the Island of Cyprus affected with more than 10 per cent. of powdery scab (spongospora subterranea) or common scab (actinomyces scabies).

This suspension will take effect from July 1st, 1941, the date on which this agreement will

enter into force.

In asking your Excellency to bring the foregoing to the knowledge of the Government of Cyprus,
